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2024 Annual Report Summary

The full report on the Marten River Fire Department's activities and achievements in 2024 is available in Appendix A. Below is a summary of the key highlights:

2024 Achievements

- Equipment Upgrades:
 - Received new MSA G1 Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) units, replacing outdated equipment.
 - The new SCBA units provide firefighters with twice the air supply of the previous models.
 - Ongoing training on the new SCBAs to ensure readiness for emergency situations.
- Rescue 5 Replacement:
 - Replaced the aging Rescue 5 vehicle with a newer model, donated by DNSSAB.
 - The vehicle was retrofitted to meet MRFD's needs and was successfully put into service.
- Re-certification and Maintenance:
 - Various pieces of equipment were re-certified.
 - Maintenance was conducted on several items to ensure operational readiness.
- New Members:
 - Two new members, Dave Vassallo and Jeff Drysdale, joined the department.
 - Both are actively working toward their certification and have already proven valuable during calls for service.

Looking Ahead to 2025

 Continued development of members' skills through training and hands-on experience.

- Plans to reorganize part of the Fire Hall by adding shelving units.
- Efforts to replace the 33-year-old Pumper 4.

January 2025 Report

Training

- January 7th:
 - Members completed the monthly inventory and vehicle checks on Pumper 3, Pumper 4, and Rescue 5.
 - SCBA (Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus) inspections were conducted.
 - The hard-wired flashlight chargers were re-installed in Rescue 5.
 - The snowmobile was inspected and tested to ensure proper operation.
- January 21st:
 - Members received training on G1 MSA SCBA equipment, including both practical exercises (donning and doffing) and theory sessions.
 - Oxygen tanks were thoroughly inspected and refilled.

Incident Response

• As of this report, the Marten River Fire Department was not deployed for any emergency incidents in January 2025.

Fire Prevention Initiatives

- The fire safety message board at the Fire Hall was updated to remind residents about fire safety, prevention, and checking CO2 detectors.
- Fire safety tips were also posted on the department's Facebook page to promote community awareness.

Additional Information

- New Helipad Completed:
 - The Marten River Volunteer Firefighters Association successfully relocated and upgraded the Helipad from the south side of the fire hall to the rear of the building (Figure 1).
 - The land was cleared, graded, and surfaced, and the new location allows for helipad lighting, enabling night landings.
 - An ORNGE inspector conducted a site visit, and as of January 16, 2025, the new helipad was certified operational for both day and night landings.
 - Special appreciation is extended to Deputy Chief Anne Siegner and her husband for leading the project, as well as to MRFD volunteers and the Marten River Community, whose fundraising efforts fully financed the project.
- Snow Removal Efforts:
 - The Temagami Works Department has been diligent in keeping the new helipad cleared of snow, ensuring it remains accessible for emergency use.

FIRE CHIEF'S REMARKS 2024

As the Marten River Fire Chief, I am pleased to present my first Marten River Volunteer Fire Department 2024 annual report.

I would like to begin by expressing my gratitude to the retired Marten River Fire Chief Paul Elliot, his advice, support and mentorship has been invaluable to me in my first year as Fire Chief. I want to thank my Deputy Chief Anne Siegner and the entire team for their dedication to the Fire Department and the community, and for their support as I transitioned to this new role. I also wanted to thank the entire municipal staff for helping me with the administrative duties that come along with the job.

It has been a busy year for the Marten River Fire Department. The year began with us taking delivery of our new MSA G1 self contained breathing apparatus. These units are much more advanced than the outdated ones we were using, and they will provide a firefighter with twice as much air as the old units did. The team has been training on the new units ensuring they are prepared to use them when required.

We replaced our aging Rescue 5 with a newer vehicle donated by DNSSAB. The vehicle was retrofitted for our purpose and successfully put in service. Various equipment was re-certified, and maintenance conducted on several items. The department also welcomed two new members this year, Dave Vassallo and Jeff Drysdale. Both these members are working hard towards their certification and have already proven to be valuable team members at calls for service.

Looking forward to 2025, the Marten River Fire Department will continue to develop the skills of its members through training and hands-on experience. We hope to reorganize part of the Firehall with the addition of shelving units, and work towards replacing our aging (33-year-old) Pumper 4.

External Training

New Recruits M. Petitipas, J. Drysdale, D. Vallasso and Junior Firefighter P. Siegner attended the NFPA 1001 Firefighter 1 & 2 OFM Certification Training Review in South River.

New Recruits J. Drysdale, D Vallasso and Junior Firefighter P. Siegner also attended weekend training sessions in Temagami for new recruits. This training covered the theory and practical components of Fire Safety, Fire Department Communications, Personal Protective Equipment, & Fire Ground Operations.

New Equipment

In January 2024 MRFD received 8 new MSA G1 SCBA's. As well through a donation from DNSSAB the department acquired a newer retired Ambulance that was retrofitted for use as our Rescue 5. The old unit was happily purchased by the Fauquier-Strickland Volunteer Fire Department for the sum of \$500.



Fire Prevention

MRFD hosted 3 community events in 2024. At each event Fire Safety was showcased with pamphlets distributed to the community and smoke/Co2 detectors available for sale. As always, the Breakfast with Sparky Event was a big hit. This event focuses on the education of the younger members of the community on the importance of fire safety. The MRFD continues to regularly change the sign out of the hall front, posting Fire Safety tips, as well as community notifications that can be seen by motorists passing the hall. In December 2024 the MRFD launched a Facebook page that will also contain regular posts of Fire Safety Tips.
